Message from the Executive Director

Crises Spur Retooling

I am pleased to present the 2020 Annual Report of the Greater Gallup Economic Development Corporation. The past year could be described in the words of Jim McKay's Wide World of Sports as presenting both the thrill of victory and the agony of defeat.

We had much to celebrate with the opening of the Greater Gallup Industrial Workforce Program and graduating our first participants, the opening of Rhino Health's first line of nitrile rubber glove manufacturing, improvements made to Carbon Coal Road, a new tenant in Stone Material Handling at the Gallup Energy Logistics Park (GELP), and the site master plans completed for GELP and the Prewitt Industrial Complex.

However, the agony probably is the most noteworthy development of 2020. Here in Gallup-McKinley County, we shared with our nation the stark challenges of the emergence of the COVID-19 coronavirus crisis. The pandemic occasioned three levels of emergency: the immediate health threat that put at risk people's health and their very lives; the extreme health measures taken in response to the virus that sought to flatten the curve of the outbreak, entailing the shutting down of businesses, schools and public places, curtailing tourism and public events, and introducing social distancing and stay-in-place orders; and the devastating impact to the economy that resulted from the first two levels of emergency.

We continue seeking to navigate through the third level of emergency, even as COVID-19 continues to ravage the world and the economy. Almost concurrent with the COVID-19 crisis were energy downturns that resulted in the shutdown of TriState's Escalante Generating Station and threated other McKinley economic base industries, such as Peabody's El Segundo mine, McKinley Paper, and the Marathon;s Gallup refinery.

Economic development now is called upon to play a new role, to rebuild our economy almost from the ground up. Our return to the thrill of victory, if we can call it that, hopefully will result from gradual outgrowths from the strategic framework that staff recently developed in collaboration with Jeff Kiely. The framework "retools" the way GGEDC approaches its work and priorities to allow us to be more effective in the new COVID-19 reality in which almost nothing remains the same as before.

OUR MISSION STATEMENT REMAINS FRONT AND CENTER GUIDING OUR WORK. WE WILL STAY ON MISSION BUT ADJUST THE FOCUS.

Our primary focus for at least the next year will be on Business Retention and Expansion (BRE), supporting existing businesses – economic-base industrial employers that are so critical to our economy. The GGEDC will engage top BRE priorities, such as the Rhino Health expansion; exploring a new Gallup Airport Cluster; McKinley Paper company expansion; and supporting Marathon Petroleum/Gallup Refinery.

Secondary priorities will be business attraction and recruitment including a refined and modified marketing program, Foreign Direct Investment, redevelopment of the Escalante/Prewitt Cluster; Gallup Energy Logistics Park; and the TransPortal (formerly the Trucking Super Center).

GGEDC also will continue to develop and conduct its Industrial Workforce Program. With physical distancing and other public protocols in place, the whole field of workforce development is challenged to innovate its way into new methods of delivering training. At the heart of the program will be close communications with employers and collaboration with them in the design of responsive training courses that generate the qualified workforce pool



they need to maintain their operations.

GGEDC is committed to continuing to provide leadership and education in economic development for the community including in areas educational course development: topical roundtables; strategic networking with & partners stakeholders; customer services & communications; and in advocating for quality of life improvements that have a direct bearing on our economic development, such as advocating for the IHS Hospital and improved medical facilities and services. improved workforce housing; and limited support of the retail sector.

Given the multiple changes impacting all businesses, the GGEDC will work to upgrade all our operations including our IT/communications technology; approach to office space safety; meeting space innovation; data management; and how we fundraise to support project development .

We recognize our strength comes from working and building our economy together. That reality has not changed. We acknowledge we would be unable to do this work without the steadfast support of the GGEDC Board, GEDA ,and many businesses and individuals in the community.

Business Retention & Expansion

Gallup Energy Logistics Park Carbon Coal Road Improvements Begin

Since 2013, Gallup Land Partners has overseen development of the Gallup Energy Logistics Park (GELP) including construction of an 11,000linear foot rail loop and securing Certified Site designation from the BNSF Railway.

Carbon Coal Road Improvements

During FY20, to support developing GELP, GGEDC collaborated with key stakeholders including McKinley County, DePauli Engineering, NWNMCOG, and Gallup Land Partners regarding final design and engineering of Carbon Coal Road.

GGEDC and other local partners engaged in collaborative discussions with NMDOT to outline project roles and responsibilities related to final design and engineering, right-of-way

Last July, Rhino Health, Inc., a U.S.based company, opened its first line of nitrile rubber glove production in McKinley County in Churchrock. Successful recruitment of this company represents a pivot for GGEDC into the manufacturing sector with strong ties to health care (long an economic base sector for McKinley County and one with long term growth potential).

GGEDC has supported Rhino Health through its Industrial Workforce Program, in obtaining LEDA funds, and has hosted community site visits to promote business opportunities. acquisition, certifications, clearances, and contractor selection. NMDOT engaged Parametrix, an engineering firm, to conduct project planning.

Present efforts are focused on advancing project development agreement including contractor finalization and mobilization in light of the recent COVID-19 pandemic and its impact on the NM Budget and the potential for reversion of capital outlay funding. Barring anv interruptions, NMDOT estimates construction will begin in early 2021 and conclude in late 2022.

Welcome Stone Material Handling

In October, Gallup Land Partners welcomed Stone Material Handling (SMH) of Saginaw Michigan, to GELP. SMH provides fracking sand

to operations in the San Juan Basin. Recruitment of SMH aligned well with GGEDC's efforts to recruit specific targeted industries to McKinley County, based on studies GGEDC first commissioned in 2013.

Rhino Health Plans Expansion

Primarily due to COVID-19, Rhino Health's business is growing rapidly.

There is a dire need for their product throughout the United States.

The pandemic also has impacted costs of production. According to Mark Lee, CEO, supply chain costs have more than doubled since the onset.

Additional facilities are badly needed to meet the heightened demand. Sponsored by the Navajo Nation, the first expansion will be into a building just east of the first factory. Rhino Health is working with GGEDC and McKinley County to plan and build a

subsequent facility for 4 additional production lines.

With a current workforce of 38 people, the company has surpassed its earlier goal of hiring 35. Rhino Health anticipates hiring another 200-350 workers when the two new buildings come online.

Business Retention & Expansion Escalante Generating Station Closure: Crisis & Opportunity

McKinley Paper Eyes Plant Upgrade

McKinley Paper, a subsidiary of Mexico-based Bio Pappel, operates two paper mills, one in Prewitt, NM and the other in the State of Washington. It produces paper for packaging, containing, and wrapping and also manufactures corrugated card board.

A key driver in McKinley Paper's decision to locate its plant in the Prewitt Industrial Park was being able to utilize steam generated by the Escalante Generating Station (EGS). When word began circulating that Tri-State Generation and Transmission Inc. was thinking of closing EG, the leadership at McKinley Paper was understandably concerned.

Through its BRE outreach, GGEDC was able to offer assistance to McKinley Paper in planning upgrades to its facilities and equipment. In turn, McKinley Paper became a member of the Workforce Development Program Leadership Team and has provided significant support and career opportunities to the GGIWP program.

Now, McKinley Paper has no intention to leave Prewitt. GGEDC helped to cement its role as "anchor tenant" in the Prewitt Industrial Park and as a key participant on the Tri-State Transition Team with NWNMCOG. GGEDC views an expansion at McKinley Paper as a major win for the region, ensuring stable jobs, property tax payments, and increased GRT revenues for McKinley County.

GGEDC Spearheads Transition Planning for Prewitt Industrial Complex

Impacts of Escalante Generating Station's Closing



The planned closure at the end of 2020 of the Escalante Generating Station (EGS) is a cause of great concern as it is eliminating over 100 economic base jobs and millions of dollars in property taxes.

GGEDC, through long-term economic development planning and BRE outreach efforts with management at Escalante and Tri-State Generation and Transmission Association, was able to anticipate and make plans for the eventual closing. Prewitt Industrial Planning completed under HM 72 is

> augmented by HB 8 which will establish an independent

> development authority to oversee the planned EGS transition .

> GGEDC has been involved in building coalitions, educating state and local officials, conducting economic

impact analyses, and demonstrating how the redevelopment plan will look.

Tri-State has been a good corporate neighbor, working closely with GGEDC, **McKinley** and Cibola Counties. NWNMCOG, and others to develop a public-private partnership to provide private sector capital and help implement further planning and development of the Industrial Park.



Tri-State agreed to keep a staff of 10 employees in place to operate and maintain the steam generator and water treatment system to support McKinley Paper's operations. The arrangement is expected to be in place for two-years.

Over years of conducting several GGEDC's Business Retention and Expansion (BRE) surveys and other Economic outreach to local base employers, the critical need for a comprehensive approach to workforce development in the Gallup-McKinley County region was a consistent theme.

Responding to the need, last summer, The GGEDC established the Greater Gallup Industrial Workforce Program (GGIWP), the first of its kind industry-led program in New Mexico geared to supplying current and incoming industries with a trained and ready workforce that can meet and exceed the needs of local businesses.

The 10-week long, tuition-free program helps participants to bridge the gap

between the education and work skills they have and those industrial employers require at the entry level.

The program is available to McKinley County residents of varying ages (ages 17-62 to date) with an earnest desire, commitment, and ability to acquire state-of-the-art technical work and career skills. Graduates are placed into

jobs primarily with GGEDC's industrial partner companies.

Providing national certification through the National Center for Construction Education and Research (NCCER), the program offers stackable credentials and its industry-led curriculum is adaptable to industry needs.

The Workforce Leadership

Team drafted the core curriculum. The Team consists of three GGEDC Board members, Kent Wilson (Owner, Four Corners Welding & Gas Supply), Joe Mesich, (President, Advanced Technical Services), Scott Hanks, (VP, Gallup Refinery), and McKinley Paper staff Cesar Soria, Operations Manager, and Arthur Miller, Training Coordinator.

The Leadership Team ensures that employer-approved certifications for specific skills training are in-demand and appropriate skills for the GGIWP participants to acquire. The Team also supports the job placement process. In its first year, the GGIWP achieved some very significant goals, including conducting its first two classes, and graduating and helping 24 of 27 total participants to obtain well-paid jobs.

GGEDC in turn demonstrated its commitment to support its BRE partners by analyzing and then addressing a critical need identified in BRE surveys.

"The most exciting development this last year has been reinstilling the love of hands-on work in the Northwest region of New Mexico while providing for selfsufficient wages for the GGIWP participants."



The program began in July 2019 with the hire of Johnny Gonzalez, a Workforce Development professional Level 5 trainer who hailed from Biloxi, MS. After designing the program with the Leadership Team and GGEDC staff, GGEDC partnered with the New Mexico Department of Workforce Solutions to select the program participants.

The COVID-19 pandemic halted starting the third class. Currently, GGIWP is developing online training, and gearing up to utilize tool and machine simulators, and meet OSHA safeguards for social distancing. GGIWP will continue to provide effective hands-on construction/industrial training.

Business Attraction & Recruitment

GGEDC Oversees High-Priority Economic Studies

Economic development planning at GGEDC often recommends focused professional studies to drive and influence public planning, build organizational and community awareness, and strategic engagement to address existing and emerging concerns and opportunities.

Last year, GGEDC helped to grant fund, facilitate, and guide the work of professional consultants to complete three studies: a Gallup Retail Market Analysis for the City of Gallup; a Comprehensive Housing Study for the City; and an Inland Port Feasibility Analysis for McKinley County.

Retail Market Study - Last July, GGEDC convened a coalition of seven nonprofits and the City of Gallup Marketing and Tourism Department to strategize how to improve Gallup's retail sector and to limit "leakages" of capital out of McKinley County (leakages occur when people go out of town to purchase goods and services).

The City hired Place Dynamics, LLC to perform the study and upgrade a

prior retail study it completed in 2013.

With an extensive analysis of cell phone data and qualitative interviews, Place Dynamics demonstrated that Gallup's trade area is far larger than conventional market analysis indicates, the population has a much greater disposable income, and, prior to COVID-19, local retailers were capturing only \$624 million of a \$2 billion market annually. GGEDC will use this information and associated marketing materials to support business attraction and recruitment.

Comprehensive Housing

Study - GGEDC noted in its BRE surveys that companies see housing their workers as a challenge to doing business in Gallup. GGEDC supported the City of Gallup to obtain Legislative funding for a comprehensive housing Sites Southwest, analysis. the consultant, confirmed in its analysis that ample opportunities exist for investors and developers to address critical housing shortages across income levels and housing types in the City. Making sufficient and reasonably priced housing options available for working people in Gallup is a critical economic development need.

Inland Port Study

McKinley County hired the firm Martin & Associates to assess whether an Inland Port facility providing a hub for intermodal rail, trucking and logistics to support regional distribution services would be feasible in McKinley County.

The consultant determined there is insufficient population in the region to sustain an inland port, and that Gallup would have special challenges trying to compete with established rail-freight shipping routes. Significant opportunities nonetheless exist to support a Gallup TransPortal trucking hub and car-load and manufacturing operations at GELP. Energy Logistics Park.

Upgrading GGEDC Tech & Data Capacity demographics, local taxes information **IEDC Datasets**

Core to the success of GGEDC's mission is possessing, sharing, and being able to interpret accurate, up to date data and information to site selectors and individuals exploring locating their businesses and families in McKinley County. The International Economic Development Council (IEDC) sets standards for types of information site selectors commonly seek. Known as IEDC Datasets, information is gathered in 25 include categories. and the area's leading employers.

Last spring, GGEDC staff overhauled and updated the GGEDC datasets. Now, staff seeks to better integrate the information into the GGEDC website.

Website Upgrades & Analytics

GGEDC contracts with Golden Shovel Agency (GSA), a national economic development-focused company to manage its website. The GGEDC website is a critical portal used by companies and individuals seeking to learn about Gallup and opportunities to do business here.

GGEDC has upgraded and enhanced the functionality of its website and also launched a new "microsite" for the GGIWP: www.gallupedc.com/workforce.

According to GSA analytics of traffic to the website in 2019, the most visited page was an article on Rhino Health's plans to open its glove manufacturing plant. Other popular pages included the History of Greater Gallup EDC, and pages featuring Gallup's Key Industries, and Top Employers.

Analysis of traffic to the GGEDC website during the first five months of 2020 showed that year over year traffic has nearly doubled and shows a clear upward trend line.
